



You do not need a visa if you come from the EU/EFTA member states, the UK, and or any visa-free country listed by the Polish Ministry of Foreign Affairs. A valid travel document entitles you to enter Poland.

Citizens of other countries must obtain a visa prior to arrival. Please note that it can take up to 15 days to process a short-stay visa so early application is recommended.

Short-stay entry conditions for non-visa-free nationals:

- 1. You will not stay in the Schengen Area for more than 90 days in the 180-day period preceding your visit.
- 2. You have a **valid travel document** satisfying the following criteria:
 - a. Valid for at least three months after your intended date of departure. In a justified case of emergency, this obligation may be waived.
 - b. Issued less than 10 years before your date of arrival.
- 3. You have a valid visa, if required, except where you hold a valid residence permit or valid long-stay visa.
- 4. You **justify the purpose** and conditions of the intended visit and have **sufficient means of subsistence** for the duration of the visit and for the return to your country of origin or transit to a third country into which you are certain to be admitted, or are in a position to acquire such means lawfully:
 - a. You must be in possession of at least:
 - 300 PLN if your visit does not extend beyond 4 days
 - 75 PLN for each day if your visit exceeds 4 days, or an equivalent amount in foreign currency
 - b. In case where you do not possess a return ticket, you must possess the financial measures in the amount of the price of the ticket that you travelled with to Poland during border control, however not less than:
 - 200 PLN if you came from a country neighbouring Poland
 - 500 PLN if you travelled from the territory of an EU Member State other than the one indicated in point 2
 - 2500 PLN if you travelled from a country not an EU Member State, or the equivalent of this amount in foreign currency
- 5. There is no alert for you in the <u>SIS</u> for the purposes of refusing entry.
- 6. You are not considered to be a threat to public policy, internal security, public health or the international relations of EU Member States, in particular where no alert has been issued in Member States' national databases for the purposes of refusing entry on the same grounds.
